

Our financial support of the ministry helps with support of Pastor salaries, church rent, and programming for church growth. The Mission also has staff which operates a clinic out of the church and feeds children through various nutrition sites. The ministry promotes women through a Women's Skill Center, where the women learn to speak

French, restaurant level cooking, sewing, and financial skills. Last year \$6,000 was raised from our Circuit Churches for the ministry in Senegal!

BISHOP'S "SOUL FOOD" REFLECTING ON GENERAL CONFERENCE

The postponed and much anticipated 2020 General Conference in Charlotte, North Carolina has concluded. It was an amazing experience – filled with powerful worship and inspiring missional reports all grounded and surrounded in prayer.

There were many areas in which petitions were submitted and approved. There was intentionality about the constitutional amendment that creates the regionalization of the United States, this being an equal partner with all other "central" conferences (those previously designated that are outside the U.S.). This legislation will need to be ratified by each Annual Conference requiring a 2/3 majority vote of all conferences.

After years of intensive and prayerful debate, the General Conference delegates from all over the world have discerned to remove language that prohibited United Methodist clergy from performing weddings for same-gender couples. There are still some important things about this decision that I want laity and clergy to know.

First, pastors, as chief administrator of the church, and with responsibility to lead the congregations, make the decision about officiating at a wedding. This decision is based on several factors including the couples' preparation for the marriage covenant. The change in the Book of Discipline does not change the pastoral authority in making the decision about officiating at a wedding. There is no mechanism in Conference leadership nor desire on my part as bishop to determine pastoral authority as it pertains to marriage.

Second, churches will continue to determine what weddings are held in their church buildings. Further, the desires of all clergy are to be honored and not judged by others. We know that different people have different opinions on these matters and our churches are in different contexts within the bounds of the Conference and it is my expectation that the diversity of everyone's opinion and everyone's context is to be honored.

Third, is the removal of the prohibitions that prevented a Board of Ordained Ministry from recommending a LGBTQIA+ person for ordination. Qualified LGBTQIA+ persons approved by the Board of Ordained Ministry would now be licensed, commissioned, and ordained. As the bishop, the Cabinet will continue to work with churches and clergy to ensure we have the best match possible when making appointments. We will honor the gifts of pastors and congregation's traditions. We want everyone to have a vital ministry rather than one defined by conflict. Our continued goal is to enhance ministry through theological and missional compatibility. All will be accepted, so that ministry can thrive. Integrity will be a matter for all God's people and every church will be focused to grow into the vital ministry in this changing season. Your Bishop and Cabinet will carry the faithful works of supervision and service to all churches.

The United Methodist Church truly is an international global church. We are sensitive to and honor regional and cultural attitudes toward contentious issues. We celebrate the ways these recent decisions reinforce the primacy of God's love in our lives and the world. I also recognize how they will add complexity to our life together as United Methodists.

I have been diligent in practicing my lived-out faith within our community of believers, which is diverse and inclusive. It has been intentional that our Conference lives into "Beloved Community," which affirms the unity and oneness in God, "for by one Spirit we are all baptized into one body, whether we be Jews or Gentiles, whether we be bond or free, and have been all made to drink into one Spirit. "(1 Corinthians 12:13).

Through this lens of oneness in Christ, we are invited to examine and fully embrace the "beloved community," in which we welcome all and include all. It is our time to set aside political labels and societal aspirations and practice our faith in hospitality, grace, and compassion. We are now at a point of avenues for focused ministry with global intention.

As we begin to move into understanding the implications of these decisions, I once again remind us of a quote by one of the founders of Methodism, John Wesley, "Though we cannot think alike, may we not love alike? May we not be of one heart, though we are not of one opinion? Without all doubt, we may. Herein all the children of God may unite, notwithstanding these smaller differences."

May God make it so.
